Purpose and structure of breakout sessions

The purpose of the breakout sessions is sharing of country experiences in smaller groups to facilitate interactive dialogues between countries on the challenges and successes of project implementation and to consider how to strengthen the science-policy interface and take emergent recommendations forward after project close.

Participants are invited to review the scope of each session in advance and consider which sessions they would like to attend and input into.

There are four allocated times for breakout sessions:

Breakout session 1: 11.50—13.20, Tuesday 7 November

Breakout session 2: 16:30—18:00, Tuesday 7 November

Breakout session 3: 12:00 – 13:15, Wednesday 8 November

Breakout session 4: 14:30 – 16:00, Thursday 9 November

At each time, four or five breakout groups will run in parallel in different rooms. Participants are invited to join one breakout group during each session as per the schedule below.

Note that some groups are run multiple times on multiple occasions, whereas others only run once or twice. Accordingly, participants are invited to review the schedule and manage their participation to ensure attendance in line with their interests.
